Surprise...The 2,000th Family!

On October 26th, Valerie Welllons got quite a surprise when she found out she was the 2,000th parent to participate in CfAL's parent computer program. That evening, in the training room at Tower One in New Haven, Valerie completed 10 1/2 hours of computer training and received a Certificate of Completion. In addition to getting a refurbished computer, she received a printer and speakers. CfAL installed the computer, printer and speakers in her home a few days later.

As the computer was being installed, you could hear Valerie say to her 15 year old son, Jerome, "the computer is for educational purposes only, and not for games".

Jerome, pictured on left below with Valerie, uses the computer for a wide variety of purposes, from documentaries to music. When he comes home from school he goes on the computer to reading, math and websites his teachers use to improve his academic skills. Her 9 year old son, Shawn, has become more confident as he works on websites that his teacher gave the family to help him academically.

Valerie said she participated in the parent computer program because she knew how important it was to have a computer at home for her sons' education. She said using the computer has not only helped her with helping her sons; but, the computer has also helped her in her job.

Valerie also said the computer is a great tool that provides unlimited resources and entertainment for the whole family.

She has already recommended the parent computer program to other parents.

You ask - why do we have the parent computer program? These are a few words from Migdalia Alicea, the Family Resource Coordinator at Benjamin Franklin School in Meriden.



"I have witnessed firsthand the effects of this program on the families. When I walk through the doors the first thing the kids have done is direct me to their computers. The moms have been practicing their budgeting and mock schedules. They are anxiously waiting to get on-line. The kids have been practicing their computer skills and this time it is not an outreach worker, a school teacher or a counselor helping them. It is their first and most important teachers, their parents. That for me is the ultimate reward for a job well done".

The goals of the parent computer program are to increase parents' involvement in their children's education, extend learning beyond the classroom and simultaneously help close the "digital divide".

Our Newest Partner... The City of Meriden

In September, CfAL, in partnership with the Meriden Board of Education and Meriden Children First, started up its parent computer program in Meriden, and initially targeted its program to 40 Meriden Family Zone parents of students attending the Roger Sherman Elementary School.

September 14th was an exciting day for 10 parents who attended their 1st day of computer training at Roger Sherman School in Meriden. These parents have children attending the school and took the initiative to sign up for training.

Upon completing their training 3 weeks later, the proud parents pictured below, with their instructor, Carlos Couvertier standing in the middle, were presented with a Certificate of Completion by Tom Bruenn, a member of the Meriden Board of Education. Later that week, the parents were given a refurbished computer that CfAL installed in their home, along with a year of technical support.

Initial funding for this program was made possible through the generosity of 3M and 3M CT CRT, The James H. Napier Foundation, the Liberty Bank Foundation, and the People's United Community Foundation.

Northeast Utilities donated 25

computers that were installed in the homes of the first 25 Meriden Family Zone participants. Cox Communications is providing reduced price high speed internet service for 40 eligible families who participate in the program. Cox Communications also gave a \$2,500 donation to support the parent computer program.



Planning for Hamden

In October, the Hamden Board of Education unanimously approved partnering with CfAL in promoting and delivering the parent computer program in Hamden. The plan is to give computer training and refurbished computers to 40 parents who have children attending the Church Street School. The estimated timeframe for delivering the program is April 2012.

Learning Math After School Can Be Fun

Thirteen 3rd and 4th grade students from the poorest neighborhoods of New Haven completed a 5-week math training program. The goal of the program was to significantly improve these students' math literacy and attitude toward math.

Based on a final day assessment test, the lowest performing student scored a 91, and the average of all scores was a 94. In addition, 100 percent of the students indicated they had a more positive attitude toward math and felt more confident in solving math problems.

It was a happy day in August when the children received their Certificates of Completion and became Math Stars; but also a sad day knowing it was their last day of class for the summer.

How To Start Your Own Business

In partnership with the Housing Authority of the City of New Haven, CfAL delivered a 5-week summer course called "How to Start Your Own Business" to a group of sixteen 13 to 17 year old Housing Authority students.



Each student created a business plan using Microsoft Word and their business' 1st year financials using Microsoft Excel. The final session included each student presenting their business plan and 1st year financials using Microsoft PowerPoint. The most intriguing business plan was presented by the 15 year old, Rashad Ratchford pictured above, whose company specialized in reducing friendly fire casualties in conflict.

The course built confidence in each student's ability to be creative and start their own business.

For the past 7 years, CfAL has had a wonderful partnership with UCONN Gear Up and through their grant received funding to deliver teaching technology training to more than 90 teachers at Wilbur Cross High School in New Haven. For business reasons, UCONN Gear Up was unable to provide funding for this academic-year.

The CfAL Board of Directors thought teacher technology training is so important that CfAL must continue the training without our partner. Thus 32 teachers, who are now in training, are benefiting from the Board's decision.
